- A range of treatments are available, including surgery, radiation therapy, and chemotherapy.
- Many breast lumps are not cancerous, but any woman who is concerned about a lump or change should see their doctor.
 - An early diagnosis of breast cancer increases the chance of recovery.
- Once a month you should do a self-breast exam in the shower.

Celebrating Diversity

Global Diversity Awareness Month acknowledges and celebrates the value of every human being regardless of their nationality, color, race, sex, gender, country of origin, language, or otherwise. It is a recognition that the many cultures throughout the world create a deep and magnificent human tapestry!

Aboriginal Australians are the guardians of the world's oldest continuous culture that dates back more than 60,000 years. They have a long and rich, living culture full of food, traditions, music, and art. All of which help to tell their story and preserve their culture.

Dot paintings are the visual stories of the Aboriginal people and is the most recognized style of Aboriginal art today. Early Aboriginal peoples used dots as patterns carved into artifacts and in ancient rock galleries. Dots were also used in body painting for ceremonies. The dot painting technique

started to be used by artists in the early 1970's. The filling in of designs with dots obscured certain information artists considered secret or sacred symbols as they found growing public audience who wanted to buy their art. Aboriginal Artists use symbols patterns, and images, and to create dot art. Painting images are first outlined with a paintbrush and then dotted patterns are added using a stick dipped into paint. Whether dot paintings are created on tree bark, canvas, or objects - they all share common elements. Dot paintings tell a story, use symbols and images that have meaning, and there is a connection between the artist and the work. Emily Kame Kngwarreye is Australia's most successful female artist. Creation - one of her large dot paintings - sold for \$2.1 million dollars.
