

National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day

December 7, 2025 By: Wendy Morris

On a quiet morning on December 7, 1941 my uncle, Allen Smith was on the deck of the USS Talbot with one other sailor. Allen was the lead signalman on the Navy destroyer buoyed at Pearl Harbor. It was 8AM, Morning Colors were beginning and as the flag was raised aircraft were noticed in the distance. Using a high-powered spotting glass, Allen was horrified to see Japanese planes with smoke and explosions in the distance. Soon there were three airplanes to his left, they were "so low on the cane field you could see the prop wake on the cane as they flew towards us." Less than 100-150 feet away from the Talbot they released torpedoes. Allen notified the captain and sounded the alarm and then madness broke loose.

The whole sky was covered with airplanes. "I experienced an airplane coming at me with flashing bursts." As Allen and the captain watched on deck the Arizona went up in flames about 1000 yards from them. The vessels were in close quarters making it impossible to fight back without hitting other US vessels and in the midst of the chaos the Talbot left the harbor heading for open sea, but not without significant challenges. The air was thick with black smoke that made navigation perilous and the Japanese sought to disable the destroyer hoping to block the entrance to Pearl Harbor. They made two waves of attacks on the destroyer and missed.

The Talbot had orders to rendezvous with the Enterprise in open waters and as they passed the grounded Nevada in the harbor the signalman flashed the message Good Hunting. "Everyone knew we were fighting for our lives." The Talbot went on to seek its revenge on the Japanese navy in the Marshall and Gilbert Islands.

"Pearl harbor was a big change in your life, and people reflected on the girls they left behind, mothers and fathers, and things they wanted to do. Everyone realized it was a new world now."

December 7, 1941, launched a surprise attack on the U.S. naval base at Pearl Harbor Hawaii, resulting devastating blow to the Pacific fleet and causing over deaths. 2,400 American destroyed or nearly 20 American naval vessels, including eight battleships, and over 300 aircraft, and propelled the United States into World War II. The day after the attack, President Franklin D. Roosevelt asked Congress to declare war on Japan.

Allen Smith's first-hand account of his experiences at Pearl Harbor were included in a book, *Events That Shaped a Nation* by Rick Phalen that was published in 2001. After the attack Allen went on to become a Navy pilot and served in the US Navy for 34 years in WWII, Korea, Vietnam, and in astronaut recovery for NASA.


